Pastor's Monthly Message Best & Worst Moments

grew up dreaming of playing professional baseball. I was good...but not good enough. After finishing my college career, I continued to play in our local summer league but I never really lingered on the fact that major league baseball was an unrealized dream. I played because I loved the game. Recently I came across a stat that put my childhood dream into perspective. Major League Baseball has been around for 147 years and there have been about 23,000 players who played professional baseball. The smallest stadium by capacity is Progressive Field with a seating capacity of 37,830 people. That means that everyone who has ever played professional baseball would fit in one stadium with room for about 14,000 more people. Over time I have learned to appreciate all the life lessons baseball provided.

In MLB history there have been 24 perfect games pitched (no batter gets on base via hit, walk, error or hitting a batter), 322 no hitters, 968 1 hitters (twice the first hit was surrender with 2 outs in the ninth inning). Digging deeper into the stats it gets more interesting.

How many of you have heard of Bob Hendley? With a career 48-52 record why would you have?

How about Sandy Koufax? If you know anything about the history of baseball you likely have heard the name. He's a hall of famer and regarded as one of a handful of the best pitchers ever.



On September 9th, 1965, the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs by a score of 1-0. That day Sandy Koufax threw a perfect game including 14 strike outs. The losing pitcher that day gave up just one run in the fifth inning on a walk, a sacrifice, a stolen base and error. The first and only hit of the game came on a blooper over the first baseman's head two innings later.

The pitcher that day...Bob Hendley. Baseball, like life, can be cruel. A bad bounce, a broken bat, a bad throw and the chance at immortality is gone. I can't imagine the frustration of pitching the best game of your life and still losing. In the moment, I can imagine the heart break. But taking a step back, I also imagine the pride of competing toe to toe with one of the greatest of all time.

The difference between moments of jubilee and heart

It is a unifying principle in an increasingly fragmented world...As the movie "Lilo and Stitch" define it," 'ohana' means family, and family means nobody is left behind or forgotten."

Isn't that what a community of faith is all about? Family, friends, neighbors, community, all coming together to support one another in times of troubles. As Floridians we are very acquainted with the 'ohana' concept when hurricanes, with all their fury, bear down on us. We reach out and help one another.

"for the kingdom of heaven has come near" (3:2). Jesus' preaching imitates that call (4:17). In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus interprets discipleship and God's blessings in terms of kingdom talk (5:3, 10, 19, 20). The disciples in turn are sent out in a mission with the same message of the kingdom (10:7)."

For several years I've participated in the Northeast Minnesota synod lay leader program. One of the books we're reading this year is Kingdom Come: Why We Must Give Up Our Obsession with Fixing the Church--and What We Should Do Instead by Reggie McNeal. The author states there is a reason Jesus taught us to pray "thy Kingdom come..." and not "thy church come." In Kingdom Come, church ministry consultant Reggie McNeal reveals why it's crucial to realign the church's mission with God's ultimate Kingdom agenda.

I find this approach to ministry today very exciting and refreshing as a stewardship leader. People give financially to a compelling church "vision." The Kingdom of heaven on earth is now and into the future where God's values and vision for humankind rule and we are all invited to participate. We don't have to wait until after death for this wonderful opportunity to share in God's restoration plan for ourselves, our church and our community. This is definitely Good News!
